## What We Do

The Accessible Organizations Project (AOP) helps public sector organizations to meet the requirements of the *Accessible BC Act*. More than 750 public sector organizations, also known as prescribed organizations, are required to meet the provincial legislation, and we are here to help you lead the way to a barrier-free B.C. We offer support to ensure organizations have the tools to become more accessible for their staff, clients and visitors.

We offer individual guidance, quarterly webinars and a host of self-help resources to support your organization through this process.

Members of our team travel to local government and sector-specific events to build in-person relationships and ensure that all Prescribed Organizations have the information they need to move forward with confidence.

Whenever updates are made to the *Act*, we share them through email distribution lists and our BC Accessibility Hub website ([bcaccessibilityhub.ca](http://bcaccessibilityhub.ca)).

## The 3 Pillars

To meet the requirements of the *Act*, we will help you complete the three core steps. You will find detailed guidance, toolkits, templates and links for each step on the Hub website.

### Establish a Committee

What does your organization need to do to form an accessibility committee? Our team can provide insight as you move through the process and help to determine if additional support is needed. Further resources are being developed that can support committee engagement and retention.

### Developing a Plan
